




10-YEAR NOTE YIELD




EFFECTIVE FEDERAL FUNDS RATE









2011 – 2018 Growth (SC and US)








SC WAGE GROWTH BY SECTOR

2013 – 2018 Hourly Wage Growth, Private Employees (2018 US\$)




























Port of Charleston Export Volume Growth (YoY TEUs)





Employment Share By Firm Age








KEY TAKEAWAYS

#01: The Fed
